The IOP awards build and reinforce a sense of community by recognising and rewarding excellence in individuals and teams and their contribution to physics.


Engineering Education Scheme Wales

Congratulations to our 6th Form Team for winning the 'Best Appreciation of Safety Issues' Award in the Engineering Education Scheme Wales competition!

The EESW Project is designed to encourage young people to consider a career in STEM by giving them the opportunity to work with professional engineers in an industrial setting.

Students were given a project brief relating to a real problem within their link company, Raytheon. Working as a group with a mentor from Raytheon, they had to research and design a solution and produce a final proposal, model or working prototype. The project enabled students to gain

"Students from Year 11 participated in TCC's (Trefnu Cymunedol Cymru/Together Creating Communities) Campaign Kickstarter Training and joined the Youth in Action group, which brings together young people from across TCC member schools and groups to take action on issues affecting their communities. Molly and Aidan worked with other young leaders to create a film for TCC's 25th anniversary celebrations in October, where they were joined by TCC members, the First Minister of Wales, Members of Senedd, MPs, local councillors and other decision-makers from North East Wales. Molly and Aidan spoke about what it is like to be active in public life, take action on issues and meet with decision -makers. Molly was also one of the first young leaders ever to co-chair TCC's November strategy meeting. TCC's youth organiser said "we're delighted that students from Hawarden High are sharing their skills and experience to take action on social justice issues affecting their communities".


In addition, we will purchase educational programmes for pupils who access learning support so that they can work at home in case of a future lockdown".



'Haunt me' is a book written by the author Liz Kessler.


