

Introduction

The specification for BTEC Sport in a “normal” year comprises of 4 units which together count towards the overall award of the BTEC Sport Qualification. Their weighting is as follows:

Year 12:

Unit 1: Anatomy and Physiology – written exam 33%

Unit 7: Practical Sports – non examined coursework 17%

Year 13:

Unit 2: Health, Fitness and Lifestyle – written exam 33%

Unit 3: Careers in Sport – non examined coursework 17%

In the Summer of 2020, Pearson announced amendments to the BTEC Sport procedures for assessment due to the Covid-19 pandemic. Pupils in Year 12 (2019/20) were therefore awarded their grades for Units 1 and 7 based on the Centre Assessed Grades model. There has been no change either to the content expected to be covered in the theoretical component, or to the coursework pupils are expected to complete, for the academic year 2020/21.

Sources of evidence for Centre Determined Grades in PE

Assessment point 1 = Past paper exam question on question two – completed in lesson under **high control** on subject content from question 1 – Completed the week beginning the 9th of November.

Assessment point 2 = Past paper exam question on question three – Completed in lesson under **high control** in the week beginning the 7th of December.

Assessment point 3 = An online past paper assessment task on question four. This was a **low** level control and took place on 2nd February.

Assessment point 4 = Submitted w/c 8th March, an assessment on a past paper question five. As this mark is based on work completed at home, it is a **low** level of control assessment.

Assessment point 5 = Shortened mock exam - Questions 1, 2 and 3 of a past paper. This assessment will be completed over 2 lessons under **high control** on **Tuesday 4th May**.

Assessment point 6 = Shortened mock exam - Questions 4, 5 and 6 of a past paper. This assessment will be completed over 2 lessons under **high control** on **Tuesday 9th June**.

Class work = A range of knowledge and skills are demonstrated by students in lessons through their performance in low stakes summative assessment which includes recall tests, quizzes, verbal answers to question, small tasks carried out that are not necessarily graded or levelled, longer independent learning tasks and other low stakes tests such as use of online resources.

For those pupils who sat the BTEC exam in January, this grade may be used if it is advantageous for the pupil to do so or it may be used as evidence in the CDG process.
